William Minot Forest Wildlife Sanctuary

1951-William Minot Trust deeded 7 parcels of land (200) acres in article 39 of the Wareham Town Warrant.

1958- 9 acres of land were acquired that are contiguous with Minot Forest.

1968-Construction of nature trails, in conjunction with the Conservation Commission was planned.

1971-Nature trails were cleared and boundaries marked.

1998-Forest management project to promote new growth was completed.

2004-Theodore Barth Memorial Park dedicated (intersection of Indian Neck Rd. and Oak St.)

2005-Murphy Bog property was acquired by the Town of Wareham and incorporated into the Minot Forest. *

2006-New Trail created along Indian Neck Rd. *

2007-Bench and trash barrel installed at Minot Memorial and trash barrel placed at Barth Memorial Park. New signs placed at trails. *

* Funded with Community Preservation Act funds.
